

House Resolution 256 (AS PASSED HOUSE AND SENATE)

A RESOLUTION

1 Dedicating certain portions of the state highway system; repealing a previous dedication;
2 repealing conflicting laws; and for other purposes.

PART I

4 WHEREAS, Ms. Sophia Ruth Fisher was born on May 11, 2000, in Tifton, Georgia, the
5 fourth child following three brothers; and

6 WHEREAS, Ms. Fisher was a member of the Tift County Show Choir, served as dance
7 captain for Ladies' Choice Show Choir, and was a member of the Tift County Swim Team,
8 where she was known for her competitive spirit and as an encouraging teammate; and

9 WHEREAS, a young woman of deep and abiding faith, Ms. Fisher was an active member
10 of Northside Baptist Church, serving in her youth group, on mission trips, and volunteering
11 in various areas of ministry; and

12 WHEREAS, Ms. Fisher's life was tragically cut short on June 30, 2018, when she and her
13 mother were struck by a vehicle while cycling on Willis Still Road; and

14 WHEREAS, her sassy, red-headed personality brought life and laughter to those around her,
15 and her "Be Happy" mantra was evident in all her endeavors; and

16 WHEREAS, it is abundantly fitting and proper that this remarkable and distinguished
17 Georgian be recognized appropriately by dedicating an interchange in her memory.

19 WHEREAS, Mr. John E. Brown has long been recognized by the citizens of this state for the
20 vital role that he played in leadership and his deep personal commitment to the welfare of the
21 citizens of Georgia; and

22 WHEREAS, a son of Walter and Margaret Brown, Mr. Brown emigrated to the United States
23 from Ireland with his family to Chester County, South Carolina, when he was three years old;
24 and

25 WHEREAS, in 1780, Mr. Brown joined the South Carolina militia and fought at Rock Mount
26 and the Battle of Hanging Rock; and

27 WHEREAS, a man of deep and abiding faith, Mr. Brown became a licensed Presbyterian
28 minister in 1788; and

29 WHEREAS, Mr. Brown diligently and conscientiously devoted innumerable hours of his
30 time, talents, and energy toward the betterment of his community and state as evidenced
31 dramatically by his superlative service as the third president of the University of Georgia
32 from 1811 to 1816; and

33 WHEREAS, upon his retirement from the University of Georgia, Mr. Brown went on to
34 serve as pastor of Mt. Zion Church in Hancock County and later served as pastor of the
35 Presbyterian Church in Washington, Georgia, serving there until his move to Fort Gaines in
36 Clay County; and

37 WHEREAS, it is abundantly fitting and proper that this remarkable and distinguished
38 Georgian be recognized appropriately by dedicating a bridge in his memory.

40 WHEREAS, our nation's security continues to rely on patriotic men and women who put
41 their personal lives on hold in order to place themselves in harm's way to protect the
42 freedoms that all United States citizens cherish; and

43 WHEREAS, Sergeant Eddie Thomas Terry was born on July 2, 1947, in Manchester,
44 Georgia, the beloved son of Emmitt "Embo" and Mary B. Terry; and

45 WHEREAS, a 1946 graduate of Meriwether County Training School, Sergeant Terry served
46 as a guardian of this nation's freedom and liberty with the United States Army, serving in the
47 Vietnam War; and

48 WHEREAS, while a part of Company D 2nd Battalion 12 Cavalry in Vietnam, Sergeant
49 Terry perished when he dove into the waters of the San Rao Trach River in a heroic attempt
50 to rescue one of his squad; and

51 WHEREAS, Sergeant Terry demonstrated selfless service to this nation and his unyielding
52 commitment to protecting the people and ideals of the United States in giving the ultimate
53 sacrifice will be remembered always; and

54 WHEREAS, he embodied the spirit of service, willing to find meaning in something greater
55 than himself and it is abundantly fitting and proper that this remarkable and distinguished
56 Georgian be recognized appropriately by dedicating a bridge in his memory.

57 **PART IV**

58 WHEREAS, Dr. Barbara Pulliam has long been recognized by the citizens of this state for
59 the vital role that she has played in leadership and her deep personal commitment to the
60 welfare of the citizens of Georgia; and

61 WHEREAS, she has diligently and conscientiously devoted innumerable hours of her time,
62 talents, and energy toward the betterment of her community and state as evidenced
63 dramatically by her superlative service with the Clayton County School District as
64 superintendent since 2004; and

65 WHEREAS, Dr. Pulliam was the first female and first African American female to lead the
66 Clayton County Public School District; and

67 WHEREAS, Dr. Pulliam's significant organizational and leadership talents, her remarkable
68 patience and diplomacy, her keen sense of vision, and her sensitivity to the needs of the
69 citizens of this state have earned her the respect and admiration of her colleagues and
70 associates; and

71 WHEREAS, in 2007, Dr. Pulliam was named Superintendent of the Year by the State of
72 Georgia PTA; and

73 WHEREAS, she has been recognized with numerous honors and accolades, including the
74 Award for Positive Social Change in Education from the Fayette County NAACP, the 2007

75 National Council of Negro Women's Highest Honor Award, the Grass Roots Award from the
76 Southern Christian Leadership Conference, and National Superintendent of the Year in 2010
77 from the National Association of Black School Educators; and

78 WHEREAS, in 2005, she won the Pinnacle Award from Delta Sigma Theta, Sorority, Inc.,
79 an organization for which she is a Golden Life Member; and

80 WHEREAS, Dr. Pulliam's leadership has overseen the construction of four elementary, three
81 middle, and two high schools that allowed students who were learning in trailers to move into
82 school buildings with modern classrooms and the latest technology; and

83 WHEREAS, it is abundantly fitting and proper that this remarkable and distinguished
84 Georgian be appropriately recognized by dedicating a road in her honor.

85 **PART V**

86 WHEREAS, Mayor William "Pete" Bridges was born on August 4, 1941, in Tallapoosa,
87 Georgia, the beloved son of Martha Mae Odom Bridges and Robert Franklin Bridges; and

88 WHEREAS, Mayor Bridges served as a guardian of this nation's freedom and liberty with
89 the United States Army where he competed as a member of the U.S. Army Pistol Team,
90 placing second overall in rapid fire; and

91 WHEREAS, he began his career in sales at Cannon Electric before moving to Boston
92 Insulated Wire & Cable Company, where he was recognized with a Top Salesman Award
93 and earned a fine reputation for his problem-solving and thoroughness; and

94 WHEREAS, upon his retirement in 1971, Mayor Bridges moved to Tallapoosa and opened
95 the West Georgia Golf Company in 1983; and

96 WHEREAS, he diligently and conscientiously devoted innumerable hours of his time,
97 talents, and energy toward the betterment of his community and state as evidenced
98 dramatically by his superlative service for two terms on the Tallapoosa City Council and then
99 as the longest serving mayor of the city; and

100 WHEREAS, Mayor Bridges was a long-time member of the Tallapoosa Lion's Club and
101 served as a representative for Tallapoosa residents with the Georgia Municipal Association
102 as a member of the association's board of directors; and

103 WHEREAS, a man of deep and abiding faith, Mayor Bridges was an active member of Our
104 Lady of Perpetual Help Catholic Church in Carrollton, Georgia; and

105 WHEREAS, Mayor Bridges embodied the spirit of service and it is abundantly fitting and
106 proper that this remarkable and distinguished Georgian be recognized appropriately by
107 dedicating a road in his memory.

108 **PART VI**

109 WHEREAS, the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., stands as one of the most prominent
110 Georgians of the twentieth century; and

111 WHEREAS, Reverend King attended public school in Georgia, graduating from high school
112 at the age of 15, and received his bachelor's degree in 1948 from Morehouse College; and

113 WHEREAS, after three years of theological study at Crozer Theological Seminary in
114 Pennsylvania, where he was elected president of the senior class, he was awarded a divinity
115 degree in 1951, and, with a fellowship won at Crozer, he enrolled in graduate studies at
116 Boston University, completing his residence for the doctorate in 1953 and receiving his
117 doctoral degree in 1955; and

118 WHEREAS, in 1957, Reverend King was elected president of the Southern Christian
119 Leadership Conference, and, in the 11 years between 1957 and 1968, he traveled over six
120 million miles and spoke over 2,500 times in support of civil rights and wrote five books as
121 well as numerous articles; and

122 WHEREAS, he led a massive protest in Birmingham, Alabama, that caught the attention of
123 the entire world, providing what he called a coalition of conscience and inspiring his "Letter
124 from a Birmingham Jail," a manifesto of the Civil Rights Movement in the United States; and

125 WHEREAS, Reverend King also planned and participated in numerous protests and
126 demonstrations for the cause of civil rights including the peaceful march on Washington,
127 D.C., of 250,000 people to whom he delivered his famous "I Have a Dream" address at the
128 Lincoln Memorial; and

129 WHEREAS, he was awarded five honorary degrees; was named Man of the Year by *Time*
130 magazine in 1963; and, at the age of 35, was the youngest man to have been awarded the
131 Nobel Peace Prize; and

132 WHEREAS, through his tireless work on behalf of civil rights for all people, he became not
133 only the symbolic leader of African Americans in the United States but also a world figure
134 in the fight for justice for all; and

135 WHEREAS, it is abundantly fitting and proper that this remarkable and distinguished
136 Georgian be recognized appropriately by dedicating a road in his memory.

137 **PART VII**

138 WHEREAS, Deputy Emory A. Rowland was highly regarded by the citizens of his
139 community and state and by local government officials as a person of unquestioned integrity
140 and dedication to the sound principles of law enforcement; and

141 WHEREAS, Deputy Rowland diligently and conscientiously devoted innumerable hours of
142 his time, talents, and energy toward the betterment of his community and state as evidenced

212 owner of Great South Harley-Davidson® in Newnan, Georgia, which opened its doors on
213 May 4, 2007, and stands as one of the newest Harley-Davidson® dealerships in the
214 Southeast; and

216 three remarkable children, Sonya, Sherry, and Kevin; six wonderful grandchildren, Trenton,

262 country team in 1979 and was named Coach of the Year in track and field in 1975, 1976, and
263 1987; and

264 WHEREAS, Mr. Forsh has been recognized twice as Douglas County Comprehensive High
265 School's Teacher of the Year and has directed and organized events for the Special Olympics
266 for over 30 years; and

267 WHEREAS, it is abundantly fitting and proper that this remarkable and distinguished
268 Georgian be recognized appropriately by dedicating a road in his honor.

270 WHEREAS, Mr. Sean P. Kornacki was a dedicated and faithful public servant whose life
271 was tragically cut short in the line of duty as the District 6 highway maintenance foreman
272 with the Georgia Department of Transportation; and

273 WHEREAS, Mr. Kornacki diligently and conscientiously devoted innumerable hours of his
274 time, talents, and energy toward the betterment of his community and state as evidenced
275 dramatically by his superlative service after numerous severe weather incidents in this state;
276 and

277 WHEREAS, he played a vital role in recovery efforts in Georgia after Hurricane Michael in
278 2018 and was known for his willingness to do whatever was necessary to ensure roads in this
279 state were clear and safe for travel; and

280 WHEREAS, Mr. Kornacki obtained his commercial driver's license and completed tanker
281 and hazmat endorsements; and

282 WHEREAS, he was known by his colleagues and others to be a very kind and generous
283 person who was always willing to help and who never once hesitated when performing his
284 job duties; and

285 WHEREAS, Mr. Kornacki served with honor and distinction with the Georgia Department
286 of Transportation for both Walker and Chattooga counties and his unyielding commitment
287 set the standard for public service; and

288 WHEREAS, it is abundantly fitting and proper that this remarkable and distinguished
289 Georgian be appropriately recognized by dedicating an intersection in his memory.

291 WHEREAS, the Honorable Thomas E. Brown is a graduate of the Fulton County Regional
292 Law Enforcement Academy and began his law enforcement career in 1989 as county public
293 safety director for DeKalb County, where he managed the county's police, fire, emergency
294 medical services, and animal control departments, the 911 communications center, and
295 emergency management; and

296 WHEREAS, after serving as the Deputy Fire Chief in Atlanta, Sheriff Brown became the
297 first African American fire chief in DeKalb County, serving from 1985 until 1990; and

298 WHEREAS, in 2001, he was elected DeKalb County's Sheriff, and after four terms had
299 solidified his reputation as a person of unquestioned integrity and dedication to the sound
300 principles of law enforcement; and

301 WHEREAS, during his years with DeKalb County, he implemented community-oriented
302 policing services, led the department of public safety in successful efforts to obtain national
303 accreditation with the Commission of Accreditation of Law Enforcement Agencies, and
304 established fire safety programs taught in the county school system, which resulted in a large
305 decrease in fire-related deaths in residential homes; and

306 WHEREAS, his leadership and guidance have been instrumental as a member of the National
307 Sheriffs Association, the National Organization of Law Enforcement Executives, and the
308 Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity Incorporated; and

309 WHEREAS, the Honorable Thomas E. Brown was nominated by President Joseph R. Biden
310 Jr., confirmed by the Senate, and appointed on October 17, 2022, to serve as the United
311 States Marshal for the Northern District of Georgia; and

312 WHEREAS, it is abundantly fitting and proper that this remarkable and distinguished
313 Georgian be recognized appropriately by dedicating a bridge in his honor.

315 WHEREAS, Mr. R.T. Stanley, Jr., was born in 1943 to Louise Usher Stanley and Rodney
316 Taylor Stanley, Sr.; and

317 WHEREAS, Mr. Stanley and his father grew Vidalia onions together in the 1980s, the
318 pivotal period when Georgia's now-famous sweet onion began to receive widespread
319 recognition; and

320 WHEREAS, he was among the core group of onion growers who fought to attain legal status
321 for the sweet onion, clearly defined the growing area, and advocated for the Vidalia onion
322 to be named Georgia's official state vegetable; and

323 WHEREAS, Mr. Stanley has been recognized with numerous honors and accolades,
324 including being named the 2007 Grower of the Year by the Vidalia Onion Committee; and

325 WHEREAS, his high ideals, morals, and deep concern for his fellow citizens and the
326 devotion, patience, and understanding he demonstrates to his family and friends are admired
327 by others; and

328 WHEREAS, it is abundantly fitting and proper that this remarkable and distinguished
329 Georgian be recognized appropriately by dedicating a road in his honor.

331 WHEREAS, Michael Allen "Mac" Collins was born in Butts County, Georgia, where he was
332 educated in the local school system and later became a businessman and trucking company
333 owner; and

334 WHEREAS, Congressman Collins began his career in public service and politics in 1977
335 when he served as chairman of the Butts County Board of Commissioners until 1980; and

336 WHEREAS, he served two terms in the Georgia Senate, where he established a reputation
337 as a strong conservative leader; and

338 WHEREAS, Congressman Collins was elected to the United States House of Representatives
339 in 1992 and ably and adeptly represented the people of the Third Congressional District; and

340 WHEREAS, during his six terms in the House of Representatives, Congressman Collins
