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## CHAPTER \_\_\_\_\_

1 AN ACT concerning

2 **Criminal Procedure – Warrantless Arrest – Straw Purchase Participant**

3 FOR the purpose of adding the crime of knowingly being a participant in a straw purchase  
4 of a regulated firearm to the list of crimes subject to warrantless arrest; and  
5 generally relating to warrantless arrest.

16 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF MARYLAND,  
17 That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:

18 **Article – Criminal Procedure**

19 2–203.

1 (a) A police officer without a warrant may arrest a person if the police officer has  
2 probable cause to believe:

3 (1) that the person has committed a crime listed in subsection (b) of this  
4 section; and

5 (2) that unless the person is arrested immediately, the person:

6 (i) may not be apprehended;

7 (ii) may cause physical injury or property damage to another; or

8 (iii) may tamper with, dispose of, or destroy evidence.

9 (b) The crimes referred to in subsection (a)(1) of this section are:

10 (1) manslaughter by vehicle or vessel under § 2–209 of the Criminal Law  
11 Article;

12 (2) malicious burning under § 6–104 or § 6–105 of the Criminal Law Article  
13 or an attempt to commit the crime;

14 (3) malicious mischief under § 6–301 of the Criminal Law Article or an  
15 attempt to commit the crime;

16 (4) a theft crime where the value of the property or services stolen is less  
17 than \$1,000 under § 7–104 or § 7–105 of the Criminal Law Article or an attempt to commit  
18 the crime;

19 (5) the crime of giving or causing to be given a false alarm of fire under §  
20 9–604 of the Criminal Law Article;

21 (6) indecent exposure under § 11–107 of the Criminal Law Article;

22 (7) a crime that relates to controlled dangerous substances under Title 5 of  
23 the Criminal Law Article or an attempt to commit the crime;

24 (8) the wearing, carrying, or transporting of a handgun under § 4–203 or §  
25 4–204 of the Criminal Law Article;

26 (9) carrying or wearing a concealed weapon under § 4–101 of the Criminal  
27 Law Article;

28 (10) prostitution and related crimes under Title 11, Subtitle 3 of the  
29 Criminal Law Article; [and]

1 (11) violation of a condition of pretrial or posttrial release under § 5–213.1  
2 of this article; AND

3 (12) KNOWINGLY BEING A PARTICIPANT IN A STRAW PURCHASE OF A  
4 REGULATED FIREARM UNDER § 5–141 OF THE PUBLIC SAFETY ARTICLE.

5 Article – Public Safety

6 5–141.

7 (a) A dealer or other person may not be a knowing participant in a straw purchase  
8 of a regulated firearm for a minor or for a person prohibited by law from possessing a  
9 regulated firearm.

10 (b) A person who violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction  
11 is subject to imprisonment not exceeding 10 years or a fine not exceeding \$25,000 or both.

12 (c) Each violation of this section is a separate crime.

13 SECTION 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED, That this Act shall take effect  
14 October 1, 2023.
