4 **GENERAL SECTIONS**

5 Sec. 201. Pursuant to section 30 of article IX of the state  
 6 constitution of 1963, total state spending from state sources under  
 7 part 1 for fiscal year 2023-2024 is \$765,136,200.00 and state  
 8 spending from state sources to be paid to local units of government  
 9 for fiscal year 2023-2024 is \$40,441,500.00. The itemized statement  
 10 below identifies appropriations from which spending to local units  
 11 of government will occur:

18 Sec. 202. The appropriations authorized under this part and  
 19 part 1 are subject to the management and budget act, 1984 PA 431,  
 20 MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594.

21 Sec. 203. As used in this part and part 1:

- 22 (a) "CJIS" means Criminal Justice Information Systems.  
 23 (b) "Department" means the department of state police.  
 24 (c) "Director" means the director of the department.  
 25 (d) "DNA" means deoxyribonucleic acid.  
 26 (e) "DTMB" means the department of technology, management, and  
 27 budget.  
 28 (f) "FTE" means full-time equated.  
 29 (g) "IDG" means interdepartmental grant.



1 (h) "MCOLES" means the Michigan commission on law enforcement  
2 standards created in section 3 of the Michigan commission on law  
3 enforcement standards act, 1965 PA 203, MCL 28.603.

4 (i) "SIGMA" means the statewide integrated governmental  
5 management application.

6 (j) "Subcommittees" means the subcommittees of the senate and  
7 house standing committees on appropriations with jurisdiction over  
8 the budget for the department.

9 Sec. 204. The department and agencies receiving appropriations  
10 in this part and part 1 shall use the internet to fulfill the  
11 reporting requirements of this part. This requirement must include  
12 transmission of reports via email to the recipients identified for  
13 each reporting requirement and it must include placement of reports  
14 on an internet site.

15 Sec. 205. To the extent permissible under section 261 of the  
16 management and budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1261, all of the  
17 following apply to the funds appropriated in part 1:

18 (a) Funds must not be used for the purchase of foreign goods  
19 or services, or both, if competitively priced and of comparable  
20 quality American goods or services, or both, are available.

21 (b) Preference must be given to goods or services, or both,  
22 manufactured or provided by Michigan businesses, if they are  
23 competitively priced and of comparable quality.

24 (c) Preference must be given to goods or services, or both,  
25 that are manufactured or provided by Michigan businesses owned and  
26 operated by veterans, if they are competitively priced and of  
27 comparable quality.

28 Sec. 206. The department shall not take disciplinary action  
29 against an employee of the department or a departmental agency in



1 the state classified civil service because the employee  
2 communicates with a member of the legislature or a member's staff,  
3 unless the communication is prohibited by law and the department or  
4 departmental agency taking disciplinary action is exercising its  
5 authority as provided by law.

6 Sec. 207. The department shall prepare a report on out-of-  
7 state travel expenses not later than January 1 of each year. The  
8 travel report shall be a listing of all travel by classified and  
9 unclassified employees outside this state in the immediately  
10 preceding fiscal year that was funded in whole or in part with  
11 funds appropriated in the department's budget. The report shall be  
12 submitted to the senate and house appropriations committees, the  
13 senate and house fiscal agencies, and the state budget office. The  
14 report shall include the following information:

15 (a) The dates of each travel occurrence.

16 (b) The total transportation and related costs of each travel  
17 occurrence, including the proportion funded with state general  
18 fund/general purpose revenues, the proportion funded with state  
19 restricted revenues, the proportion funded with federal revenues,  
20 and the proportion funded with other revenues.

21 Sec. 208. Funds appropriated in this part and part 1 shall not  
22 be used by a principal executive department, state agency, or  
23 authority to hire a person to provide legal services that are the  
24 responsibility of the attorney general. This prohibition does not  
25 apply to legal services for bonding activities and for those  
26 outside services that the attorney general authorizes.

27 Sec. 209. Not later than December 31, the state budget office  
28 shall prepare and transmit a report that provides for estimates of  
29 the total general fund/general purpose appropriation lapses at the



1 close of the prior fiscal year. This report shall summarize the  
2 projected year-end general fund/general purpose appropriation  
3 lapses by major departmental program or program areas. The report  
4 shall be transmitted to the chairpersons of the senate and house  
5 appropriations committees, the subcommittees, and the senate and  
6 house fiscal agencies.

7 Sec. 210. (1) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1,  
8 there is appropriated an amount not to exceed \$2,000,000.00 for  
9 federal contingency authorization. These funds are not available  
10 for expenditure until they have been transferred to another line  
11 item in part 1 under section 393(2) of the management and budget  
12 act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

13 (2) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is  
14 appropriated an amount not to exceed \$4,000,000.00 for state  
15 restricted contingency authorization. These funds are not available  
16 for expenditure until they have been transferred to another line  
17 item in part 1 under section 393(2) of the management and budget  
18 act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1393.

19 Sec. 211. From the funds appropriated in part 1, the  
20 department shall provide to the DTMB information sufficient to  
21 maintain a searchable website accessible by the public at no cost  
22 that includes, but is not limited to, all of the following for the  
23 department:

24 (a) Fiscal year-to-date expenditures by category.

25 (b) Fiscal year-to-date expenditures by appropriation unit.

26 (c) Fiscal year-to-date payments to a selected vendor,  
27 including the vendor name, payment date, payment amount, and  
28 payment description.

29 (d) The number of active department employees by job



1 classification.

2 (e) Job specifications and wage rates.

3 Sec. 212. Within 14 days after the release of the executive  
4 budget recommendation, the department shall provide to the state  
5 budget office information sufficient to provide the senate and  
6 house appropriations chairs, the subcommittees chairs, and the  
7 senate and house fiscal agencies with an annual report on estimated  
8 state restricted fund balances, state restricted fund projected  
9 revenues, and state restricted fund expenditures for the prior 2  
10 fiscal years.

11 Sec. 213. The department shall maintain, on a publicly  
12 accessible website, a department scorecard that identifies, tracks,  
13 and regularly updates key metrics that are used to monitor and  
14 improve the department's performance.

15 Sec. 215. To the extent permissible under the management and  
16 budget act, 1984 PA 431, MCL 18.1101 to 18.1594, the director shall  
17 take all reasonable steps to ensure that geographically  
18 disadvantaged business enterprises compete for and perform  
19 contracts to provide services or supplies, or both. The director  
20 shall strongly encourage firms with which the department contracts  
21 to subcontract with certified businesses in depressed and deprived  
22 communities for services or supplies, or both.

23 Sec. 216. (1) On a quarterly basis, the department shall  
24 report to the senate and house appropriations committees, the  
25 subcommittees, and the senate and house fiscal agencies the  
26 following information:

27 (a) The number of FTEs in pay status by type of staff and  
28 civil service classification.

29 (b) A comparison by line item of the number of FTEs authorized



1 from funds appropriated in part 1 to the actual number of FTEs  
 2 employed by the department at the end of the reporting period.

3 (2) By March 1 of the current fiscal year, the department  
 4 shall report to the senate and house appropriations committees, the  
 5 subcommittees, and the senate and house fiscal agencies the  
 6 following information:

7 (a) Number of employees that were engaged in remote work in  
 8 2023.

9 (b) Number of employees authorized to work remotely and the  
 10 actual number of those working remotely in the current reporting  
 11 period.

12 (c) Estimated net cost savings achieved by remote work.

13 (d) Reduced use of office space associated with remote work.

14 Sec. 217. Appropriations in part 1 shall, to the extent  
 15 possible by the department, not be expended until all existing work  
 16 project authorization available for the same purposes is exhausted.

17 Sec. 219. The department and agencies receiving appropriations  
 18 in part 1 shall receive and retain copies of all reports funded  
 19 from appropriations in part 1. Federal and state guidelines for  
 20 short-term and long-term retention of records shall be followed.  
 21 The department may electronically retain copies of reports unless  
 22 otherwise required by federal or state guidelines.

23 Sec. 220. The department shall report not later than April 1  
 24 on each specific policy change made to implement a public act  
 25 affecting the department that was enacted and took effect during  
 26 the prior calendar year to the senate and house appropriations  
 27 committees, the subcommittees, the joint committee on  
 28 administrative rules, and the senate and house fiscal agencies.

29 Sec. 221. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1, the





1 department shall do all of the following:

2 (a) Report to the senate and house appropriations committees,  
3 the senate and house fiscal agencies, the senate and house policy  
4 offices, and the state budget office any amounts of severance pay  
5 for a department director, deputy director, or other high-ranking  
6 department official not later than 14 days after a severance  
7 agreement with the director or official is signed. The name of the  
8 director or official and the amount of severance pay must be  
9 included in the report required by this subdivision.

10 (b) Maintain an internet site that posts any severance pay in  
11 excess of 6 weeks of wages, regardless of the position held by the  
12 former department employee receiving severance pay.

13 (c) By February 1, report to the subcommittees, the senate and  
14 house fiscal agencies, the senate and house policy offices, and the  
15 state budget office on the total amount of severance pay remitted  
16 to former department employees during the fiscal year ending  
17 September 30, 2023 and the total number of former department  
18 employees that were remitted severance pay during the fiscal year  
19 ending September 30, 2023.

20 (2) As used in this section, "severance pay" means  
21 compensation that is both payable or paid upon the termination of  
22 employment and in addition to either wages or benefits earned  
23 during the course of employment or generally applicable retirement  
24 benefits.

25 Sec. 223. Based on the availability of federal funding and  
26 demonstrated need, as indicated by applications submitted to the  
27 state court administrative office, the department shall provide  
28 \$1,500,000.00 in Byrne justice assistance grant program funding to  
29 the judiciary by interdepartmental grant.



1           Sec. 224. The department shall provide biannual reports to the  
2 subcommittees, the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the state  
3 budget office that provide the following data:

4           (a) A list of major work projects, including the status of  
5 each project.

6           (b) The department's financial status, featuring a report of  
7 budgeted versus actual expenditures by part 1 line item including a  
8 year-end projection of budget requirements. If projected department  
9 budget requirements exceed the allocated budget, the report shall  
10 include a plan to reduce overall expenses while still satisfying  
11 specified service level requirements.

12           (c) A report on the performance metrics cited or information  
13 required to be reported in this part, reasons for nonachievement of  
14 metric targets, and proposed corrective actions.

15           Sec. 227. (1) When the department provides contractual  
16 services to a local unit of government, the department shall be  
17 reimbursed for all costs incurred in providing the services.

18           (2) The department shall define service cost models for those  
19 services requiring reimbursement.

20           (3) Contractual services provided to an entity other than a  
21 local unit of government may be provided by department personnel,  
22 but only on an overtime basis outside the normal work schedule of  
23 the personnel. All costs incurred in providing the services are  
24 eligible for reimbursement.

25           (4) This section does not apply to services provided to state  
26 agencies.

27           (5) Revenues received for contractual or reimbursed services  
28 in excess of the appropriations in part 1 are appropriated and may  
29 be received and expended by the department for the purposes for



1 which the funds are received.

2 (6) If additional authorization is approved in SIGMA by the  
3 state budget office under this section, the department shall notify  
4 the subcommittees and the senate and house fiscal agencies within  
5 10 days after the approval. The notification shall include the  
6 amount and funding source of the additional authorization, the date  
7 of its approval, and the projected use of funds to be expended.

8 Sec. 228. The department shall serve as an active liaison  
9 between the DTMB and state, local, regional, and federal public  
10 safety agencies on matters pertaining to the Michigan public safety  
11 communications system and shall report user issues to the DTMB.

12 Sec. 229. The department may establish and collect fees for  
13 publications, videos, conferences, workshops, and related  
14 materials. Collected fees shall be used to offset expenditures for  
15 costs of the publications, videos, workshops, conferences, and  
16 related materials. The department shall not collect fees under this  
17 section that exceed the cost of the expenditures.

18 Sec. 230. (1) The department may accept monetary and  
19 nonmonetary gifts, bequests, donations, contributions, or grants  
20 from any private or public source to support, in whole or in part,  
21 a departmental function or program. The department shall expend or  
22 use such gifts, bequests, donations, contributions, or grants for  
23 the purposes designated by the private or public source, if the  
24 purpose is specified.

25 (2) Revenue collected by the department under this section  
26 that is unexpended and unencumbered shall not lapse to the general

28 (3) Private revenues received under this section that exceed

3 (4) If additional authorization is approved in SIGMA by the  
4 state budget office under this section, the department shall notify  
5 the subcommittees and the senate and house fiscal agencies within

8 of the approval, and the projected use of the funds to be expended.

9 Sec. 231. (1) Federal revenues authorized by and available  
10 from the federal government in excess of the appropriations in part  
11 1 are appropriated and may be received and expended by the  
12 department for purposes authorized under state law and subject to  
13 federal requirements.

14 (2) The department shall notify the subcommittees and the  
15 senate and house fiscal agencies before expending federal revenues  
16 received and appropriated under subsection (1).

17 (3) If additional authorization is approved in SIGMA by the  
18 state budget office under this section, the department shall notify  
19 the subcommittees and the senate and house fiscal agencies within  
20 10 days after the approval. The notification shall include the  
21 amount and funding source of the additional authorization, the date  
22 of its approval, and the projected use of the funds to be expended.

23 Sec. 232. It is the intent of the legislature that the  
24 department shall take all steps necessary to protect the data and  
25 privacy of citizens who are not the focus of a departmental  
26 investigation and to protect personal information from unauthorized  
27 access or misuse. This includes, but is not limited to, requiring  
28 vendors or service providers to protect data shared with them,  
29 ensuring that when personal data is collected, but no longer



1 utilized by the department, that reasonable steps be taken to  
2 securely destroy records containing personal information when it is  
3 to be discarded so that the information is rendered indecipherable  
4 and is not sold for marketing or other purposes. In addition, the  
5 department shall provide written notification to any data subject  
6 whose sensitive personal information is accessed or acquired by an  
7 unauthorized person.

8 Sec. 235. In collaboration with the Michigan department of  
9 health and human services and the Michigan department of education,  
10 the department shall advise on initiatives in schools and other  
11 educational organizations that include, but are not limited to,  
12 training for educators, teachers, and other personnel in school  
13 settings for all of the following:

14 (a) Utilization of trauma-informed practices.

15 (b) Age-appropriate education and information on human  
16 trafficking.

17 (c) Age-appropriate education and information on sexual abuse  
18 prevention.

19 Sec. 236. It is the intent of the legislature that the  
20 department maximize the efficiency of the state workforce and,  
21 where possible, prioritize in-person work. Each executive branch  
22 department, agency, board, or commission that receives funding  
23 under part 1 must post its in-person, remote, or hybrid work policy  
24 on its website.

27 Sec. 301. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1 for  
28 professional development bureau, the department may provide or  
29 obtain the following training:



1 (a) Training that directly relates to the individual's job

4 (c) Training that provides the individual with the ability to  
5 seek expanded opportunities within the department.

6 (d) Advanced education training.

7 (e) De-escalation training.

8 (2) Not later than January 1, 2024, the department shall  
9 submit a report to the senate and house appropriations committees,  
10 the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the state budget office  
11 that includes the following information about the funds  
12 appropriated in part 1 for the professional development bureau:

13 (a) The training courses that the department's employees  
14 completed.

15 (b) If a training course is developed by the department, a  
16 description of that course's curriculum and its purpose.

17 (c) The number of the department's employees who have received  
18 completed a training pursuant to this section.

19 Sec. 302. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1, the  
20 department shall, in collaboration with the department of civil  
21 rights and MCOLES, provide the following training to local police  
22 departments or officers free of charge:

23 (a) Cultural awareness and competency.

24 (b) Tolerance, diversity, and implicit bias.

25 (c) Conflict management and de-escalation.

26 (d) Use of force on vulnerable individuals, including  
27 children, people with disabilities, people with unmet mental health  
28 needs, people under the influence of substances, and pregnant  
29 people.



1 (e) Mental health and wellness for police.

2 (2) The training provided under subsection (1) may be offered  
3 online in order to be easily accessible, and can be given by  
4 department staff, a contractor, or an outside vendor.

5 (3) On a quarterly basis, the department shall report to the  
6 subcommittees, the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the state  
7 budget office the number of officers by police department that  
8 received training under this section.

9

10 **LAW ENFORCEMENT**

11 Sec. 401. (1) The department shall develop and deliver  
12 professional, innovative, and quality training that supports the  
13 enforcement and public safety efforts of the criminal justice  
14 community.

15 (2) The department shall provide performance data, as provided  
16 under section 224, for days of training being conducted by the  
17 academy.

18 (3) The department shall submit a report to the subcommittees  
19 and the senate and house fiscal agencies within 60 days of the  
20 conclusion of any trooper, motor carrier, or state properties  
21 security recruit school. The report shall include the following:

22 (a) The number of veterans and the number of MCOLES-certified  
23 police officers who were admitted to and the number who graduated  
24 from the recruit school.

25 (b) The total number of recruits who were admitted to the  
26 school, the number of recruits who graduated from the school, and  
27 the location at which each of these recruits is assigned.

28 (4) The department shall distribute and review course  
29 evaluations to ensure that quality training is provided.



1           Sec. 402. (1) In accordance with applicable state and federal  
2 laws and regulations, the department shall maintain and ensure  
3 compliance with CJIS databases and applications in the support of  
4 public safety and law enforcement communities.

5           (2) The department shall improve the accuracy, timeliness, and  
6 completeness of criminal history information by conducting a  
7 minimum of 30 outreach activities targeted to criminal justice  
8 agencies. The department shall report the number of these outreach  
9 activities conducted, as provided under section 224.

10          (3) The department shall provide for the compilation of crime  
11 statistics consistent with the uniform crime reporting (UCR)  
12 program and the national incident-based report system (NIBRS).

13          (4) The department shall provide for the compilation and  
14 evaluation of traffic crash reports and the maintenance of the  
15 state accident data collection system.

16          (5) The department shall make individual traffic crash reports  
17 available for a fee of \$10.00 per incident. The department may also  
18 sell an extract of electronic traffic crash data for a fee of \$0.25  
19 per incident, provided that the name, address, and any other  
20 personal identifying information have been excluded.

21          (6) By March 1, the department shall submit a report to the  
22 subcommittees, the senate and house fiscal agencies, and the state  
23 budget office detailing the number of traffic crash reports  
24 provided, the amount of revenue collected, and all expenditures  
25 incurred for activities under subsection (5) in the preceding  
26 fiscal year. The report must include an analysis of whether revenue  
27 from department activities under subsection (5) is sufficient to

5 records information with the Federal Bureau of Investigation and

8 and indices.

9 (8) In accordance with applicable state and federal laws, the  
10 department shall provide for the maintenance of records, including  
11 criminal history records regarding firearms licensure, as provided  
12 in 1927 PA 372, MCL 28.421 to 28.435.

13 (9) The department shall provide information on the number of  
14 background checks processed through the internet criminal history  
15 access tool (ICHAT), as provided in section 224.

16 (10) The following unexpended and unencumbered revenues  
17 deposited into the criminal justice information center service fees  
18 shall not lapse to the general fund, but shall be carried forward  
19 into the subsequent fiscal year:

20 (a) Fees for fingerprinting and criminal record checks and  
21 name-based criminal record checks under 1935 PA 120, MCL 28.271 to  
22 28.274.

23 (b) Fees for application and licensing for initial and renewal  
24 concealed pistol licenses under 1927 PA 372, MCL 28.421 to 28.435.

25 (c) Fees for searching, copying, and providing public records  
26 under the freedom of information act, 1976 PA 442, MCL 15.231 to  
27 15.246.

28 (d) Revenue from other sources, including, but not limited to,  
29 investment and interest earnings.



1 (11) Unexpended and unencumbered revenue generated by state  
2 records management system fees shall not lapse to the general fund,  
3 but shall be carried forward into the subsequent fiscal year.

4 Sec. 403. (1) The department shall provide forensic testing  
5 and analysis/profiling of DNA evidence to aid in law enforcement  
6 investigations in this state.

7 (2) The department shall ensure its ability to maintain  
8 accreditation by a federally designated accrediting agency, as  
9 provided under 34 USC 12592.

10 (3) The department shall provide forensic science services  
11 with an average turnaround time of 55 days, assuming an annual  
12 caseload volume commensurate with the average annual caseload  
13 received by the forensic science division during the preceding 5  
14 fiscal years, and shall work to achieve a goal of a 30-day average  
15 turnaround time across all forensic science disciplines.

16 (4) The department shall provide the following data as  
17 provided in section 224:

18 (a) The average turnaround time for processing forensic  
19 evidence across all disciplines.

20 (b) Forensic laboratory staffing levels, including scientists  
21 in training, and vacancies.

22 (c) The number of backlogged cases in each discipline.

23 Sec. 404. (1) The biometrics and identification division shall  
24 house and manage the automated biometric identification system, the  
25 statewide network of agency photographs, and combined offender DNA  
26 index system biometric databases.

27 (2) The department shall provide data on the number of 10-  
28 print and palm-print submissions to the database, as provided in  
29 section 224.



1 (3) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources  
2 necessary to have a 28-day average wait time for scheduling a  
3 polygraph examination, assuming an annual caseload received  
4 commensurate with the average annual caseload received during the  
5 preceding 5 fiscal years, with a goal of achieving a 15-day average  
6 wait time.

7 (4) If changes are made to the department's protocol for  
8 retaining and purging DNA analysis samples and records, the  
9 department shall post a copy of the protocol changes on the  
10 department's website.

11 Sec. 405. Not later than December 1, the department shall  
12 submit a report to the subcommittees and senate and house fiscal  
13 agencies that includes, but is not limited to, all of the following  
14 information:

15 (a) Sexual assault kit analysis backlog at the beginning of  
16 the prior fiscal year.

17 (b) The number of sexual assault kits collected or submitted  
18 for analysis during the prior fiscal year.

19 (c) The number of sexual assault kits analyzed and the number  
20 of associated DNA profiles created and uploaded during the prior  
21 fiscal year.

22 (d) Sexual assault kit analysis backlog at the end of the  
23 prior fiscal year.

24 (e) The average turnaround time to analyze sexual assault kits  
25 and to create and upload associated DNA profiles for the prior  
26 fiscal year.

27 Sec. 406. The department shall provide administrative support  
28 for the following grant and community service programs:

29 (a) The operations of the automobile theft prevention



1 authority.

2 (b) Administration of the Edward Byrne memorial justice  
3 assistance program and other grant programs, as well as the  
4 department's community policing efforts.

5 (c) Administration of the office of school safety.

6 (d) Administration and outreach of the OK2SAY program.

7 Sec. 407. Not later than March 30, the office of school safety  
8 shall provide a school safety report to the legislature and the  
9 senate and house fiscal agencies that must include the following:

10 (a) Reports of incidents of school violence or threats  
11 reported to the state police by local law enforcement or local  
12 school districts, or received through the Michigan incident crime  
13 report (MICR).

14 (b) Reports of OK2SAY-based incidences and activities.

15 (c) Based upon an evaluation of school safety incidents and  
16 analysis of school safety grants, recommendations on best practices  
17 and other safety measures to ensure school safety in this state.

18 Sec. 408. The unexpended and unencumbered general fund/general  
19 purpose funds appropriated in part 1 for trooper recruit school  
20 onboarding, training, and outfitting must not lapse to the general  
21 fund at the end of the fiscal year but must be deposited into the  
22 trooper recruit school fund created under section 819b of the  
23 Michigan vehicle code, 1949 PA 300, MCL 257.819b.

25 **MICHIGAN COMMISSION ON LAW ENFORCEMENT STANDARDS**

26 Sec. 501. (1) MCOLES shall establish standards for the  
27 selection, employment, training, education, licensing, and  
28 licensure revocation of all law enforcement officers and provide  
29 the basic law enforcement training curriculum for law enforcement



1 training academy programs statewide.

2 (2) MCOLES shall maintain staffing and resources necessary to  
3 update law enforcement standards within 120 days of the enactment  
4 date of any new legislation.

5 Sec. 502. The general fund/general purpose funds appropriated  
6 in part 1 for the public safety officers benefit fund must be  
7 deposited into the public safety officers benefit fund created in  
8 section 3 of the public safety officers benefit act, 2004 PA 46,  
9 MCL 28.633. All funds in the public safety officers benefit fund  
10 are appropriated and available for expenditure in accordance with  
11 section 3 of the public safety officers benefit act, 2004 PA 46,  
12 MCL 28.633.

13 Sec. 503. Funds appropriated in part 1 for in-service training  
14 must be deposited into the law enforcement officers training fund  
15 created in section 11(7) of the Michigan commission on law  
16 enforcement standards act, 1965 PA 203, MCL 28.611. All funds in  
17 the law enforcement officers training fund are appropriated and  
18 available for expenditure to support the implementation of required  
19 annual in-service training standards for all licensed law  
20 enforcement officers in accordance with rules promulgated under  
21 section 11(2) of the Michigan commission on law enforcement  
22 standards act, 1965 PA 203, MCL 28.611.

23

24 **FIELD SERVICES**

25 Sec. 601. (1) Department enlisted personnel who are employed  
26 to enforce traffic laws as provided in section 629e of the Michigan  
27 vehicle code, 1949 PA 300, MCL 257.629e, are not prohibited from  
28 responding to crimes in progress or other emergency situations and  
29 are responsible for making every effort to protect all residents of



1 this state.

2 (2) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources  
3 necessary to continually work to enhance traffic safety throughout  
4 this state and shall dedicate a minimum of 455,200 hours to  
5 statewide patrol, of which a minimum of 40,000 shall be committed  
6 to distressed cities in this state. The department shall work to  
7 improve public safety efforts within distressed cities by enhancing  
8 data analysis capabilities and identifying crime trends and areas  
9 with high occurrence of crime.

10 (3) The department shall report on the number of residence  
11 checks of registered sex offenders conducted, as provided under  
12 section 224.

13 (4) The department shall submit a report on or before April 15  
14 to the subcommittees and senate and house fiscal agencies regarding  
15 the secure cities partnership during the prior calendar year.

16 Sec. 602. (1) The department shall identify and apprehend  
17 criminals through criminal investigations in this state.

18 (2) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources  
19 necessary to provide a comparable number of hours investigating  
20 crimes as the average annual number provided during the preceding 5  
21 fiscal years.

22 (3) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources  
23 necessary to annually meet or exceed a case clearance rate of 62%.

24 (4) The department shall provide training opportunities to  
25 local law enforcement partners with the goal of increasing their  
26 knowledge of gambling laws, legal issues, opioid-related  
27 investigations, and other emerging law enforcement issues.

28 (5) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources  
29 necessary to investigate the average annual number of opioid-



1 related investigations conducted by multijurisdictional task forces  
2 and hometown security teams during the preceding 5 fiscal years.  
3 The department shall work to enhance investigative and drug  
4 interdiction efforts by enhancing data analysis capabilities and  
5 linking investigations among multijurisdictional task forces and  
6 hometown security teams.

7 Sec. 603. (1) The department shall provide protection to this  
8 state, its economy, welfare, and vital state-sponsored programs  
9 through the prevention and suppression of organized smuggling of  
10 untaxed tobacco products in this state, through enforcement of the  
11 tobacco products tax act, 1993 PA 327, MCL 205.421 to 205.436, and  
12 other laws pertaining to combating criminal activity in this state,  
13 and by maintaining a tobacco tax enforcement unit.

14 (2) The department shall submit an annual report on December 1  
15 to the subcommittees, the senate and house appropriations  
16 subcommittees on general government, the senate and house fiscal  
17 agencies, and the state budget office that details expenditures and  
18 activities related to tobacco tax enforcement for the prior fiscal  
19 year.

20 Sec. 604. (1) The department shall provide fire investigation  
21 training and investigative assistance to public safety agencies in  
22 this state.

23 (2) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources  
24 necessary to maintain readiness to respond appropriately to at  
25 least the average annual number of requests for fire investigation  
26 services that occurred during the preceding 5 fiscal years and  
27 shall be available for call out statewide 100% of the time.

28 Sec. 606. (1) From the funds appropriated in part 1, the  
29 department shall make an organized, strategic effort to recruit



1 trooper school candidates and other new employees that mirror the  
2 diverse racial, religious, and cultural backgrounds that make up  
3 the communities in Michigan, including individuals who are Black,  
4 Jewish, Native American, LGBTQ+, Indian/Hindu, Hispanic,  
5 Arab/Muslim, and Asian and Pacific Islander. An annual report of  
6 these recruiting efforts, along with the status of the diversity of  
7 current racial, religious, and cultural backgrounds of those  
8 employed by the department, must be reported to the subcommittees

10 (2) From the funds appropriated in part 1 that represent  
11 attrition savings, the department may use these funds to cover the

14 **SPECIALIZED SERVICES**

15 Sec. 701. (1) The department shall operate the Michigan  
16 intelligence operations center for homeland security as this  
17 state's primary federally designated fusion center to receive,  
18 analyze, gather, and disseminate threat-related information among  
19 federal, state, local, tribal, and private sector partners.

20 (2) The department shall ensure public safety by providing  
21 public and private sector partners with timely and accurate  
22 information regarding critical information key resource threats as  
23 reported to or discovered by the Michigan intelligence operations  
24 center for homeland security and shall increase public awareness on  
25 how to report suspicious activity through website or telephone  
26 communications.

27 (3) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources  
28 necessary to support the cyber section, including the Michigan  
29 cyber command center, the computer crimes unit, and the internet





1 crimes against children task force. The department shall maintain  
2 the staffing and resources necessary to complete the average annual  
3 number of cases completed by the computer crimes unit during the  
4 preceding 5 fiscal years. The unit shall pursue process improvement  
5 initiatives to effectively utilize staff resources in providing  
6 investigatory assistance and evidentiary analysis for law  
7 enforcement and criminal justice agencies statewide. The department  
8 shall maintain the staffing and resources necessary to complete the  
9 average annual casework that the Michigan cyber command center  
10 completed during the preceding 5 fiscal years.

11 (4) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources  
12 necessary to provide digital forensic analysis services with a goal  
13 of decreasing backlogs of digital forensic analysis cases annually  
14 until the department maintains a 60-day turnaround time.

15 Sec. 702. (1) The department shall provide specialized  
16 services in support of, and to enhance, local, state, and federal  
17 law enforcement operations within this state in accordance with all  
18 applicable state and federal laws and regulations.

19 (2) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources  
20 necessary to provide training to maintain readiness to respond  
21 appropriately to at least the average annual number of requests for  
22 specialty services which occurred during the preceding 5 fiscal  
23 years.

24 (3) The canine unit shall be available for call out statewide  
25 100% of the time.

26 (4) The bomb squad unit shall be available for call out  
27 statewide 100% of the time.

28 (5) The emergency support teams shall be available for call  
29 out statewide 100% of the time.



1 (6) The marine services team shall be available for call out  
2 statewide 100% of the time.

3 (7) Aviation services shall be available for call out  
4 statewide 100% of the time, unless prohibited by weather or  
5 unexpected mechanical breakdowns.

6 (8) The department shall maintain the staff and resources  
7 necessary to provide security services at the State Capitol Complex  
8 facilities, the State Secondary Complex, and other state-owned or  
9 leased properties, as provided under section 6c of 1935 PA 59, MCL  
10 28.6c. The department shall also maintain the staff and resources  
11 necessary to respond to emergencies at the State Capitol Complex,  
12 State Secondary Complex, House Office Building, Binsfeld Office  
13 Building, Capitol parking lot, Townsend Parking Ramp, Roosevelt  
14 Parking Ramp, and other areas as directed. The department shall  
15 maintain a goal of annually conducting 35,000 property inspections  
16 of state owned and leased facilities.

17 Sec. 703. (1) The department shall maintain commercial vehicle  
18 regulation, school bus inspections, and enforcement activities,  
19 including enforcement of requirements concerning size, weight, and  
20 load restrictions; operating authority; registration; fuel taxes;  
21 transportation of hazardous materials; operations of new entrants;  
22 commercial driver licenses; and inspections pursuant to the federal  
23 motor carrier assistance program.

24 (2) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources  
25 necessary to meet inspection goals consistent with the department's  
26 federal motor carrier assistance program activities.

27 (3) Revenue collected under the motor carrier act, 1933 PA  
28 254, MCL 475.1 to 479.42, shall be expended in accordance with that  
29 act. Unexpended and unencumbered revenues shall not lapse to the



1 general fund but shall be carried forward into the subsequent  
2 fiscal year.

3 Sec. 704. (1) The department shall coordinate the mitigation,  
4 preparation, response, and recovery activities of municipal,  
5 county, state, and federal governments, and other governmental  
6 entities, for all hazards, disasters, and emergencies.

7 (2) The state director of emergency management may expend  
8 money appropriated under part 1 to call upon any agency or  
9 department of the state or any resource of the state to protect  
10 life or property or to provide for the health or safety of the  
11 population in any area of this state in which the governor  
12 proclaims a state of emergency or state of disaster under the  
13 emergency management act, 1976 PA 390, MCL 30.401 to 30.421. The  
14 state director of emergency management may expend the amounts the  
15 director considers necessary to accomplish these purposes. The  
16 director shall submit to the state budget director, as soon as  
17 possible, a complete report of all actions taken under the  
18 authority of this section. The report shall contain, as a separate  
19 item, a statement of all money expended that is not reimbursable  
20 from federal funding. The state budget director shall review the  
21 expenditures and submit recommendations to the legislature in  
22 regard to any possible need for a supplemental appropriation.

23 (3) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, the  
24 department may receive and expend money from local, private,  
25 federal, or state sources for the purpose of providing emergency  
26 management training to local or private interests and for the  
27 purpose of supporting emergency preparedness, response, recovery,  
28 and mitigation activity. If additional expenditure authorization in  
29 SIGMA is approved by the state budget office under this section,



1 the department and the state budget office shall notify the  
 2 subcommittees and the senate and house fiscal agencies within 10  
 3 days after the approval. The notification shall include the amount  
 4 and source of the additional authorization, the date of its  
 5 approval, and the projected use of the funds to be expended under

7 (4) The department shall foster, promote, and maintain  
 8 partnerships to protect this state and homeland from all hazards.

9 (5) The department shall maintain the staffing and resources  
 10 necessary to do all of the following:

11 (a) Serve approximately 105 local emergency management  
 12 preparedness programs and 88 local emergency planning committees in  
 13 this state.

14 (b) Operate and maintain the state's emergency operations  
 15 center and provide command and control in support of emergency  
 16 response services.

17 (c) Maintain readiness, including training and equipment to  
 18 respond to civil disorders and natural disasters commensurate with  
 19 the capabilities of fiscal year 2010-2011.

20 (d) Perform hazardous materials response training.

21 (6) The department shall conduct a minimum of 3 training  
 22 sessions to enhance safe response in the event of natural or  
 23 manmade incidents, emergencies, or disasters.

24 (7) In addition to the funds appropriated in part 1, there is  
 25 appropriated from the disaster and emergency contingency fund an  
 26 amount necessary to cover costs related to any disaster or  
 27 emergency as defined in the emergency management act, 1976 PA 390,  
 28 MCL 30.401 to 30.421. Funds shall be expended as provided under  
 29 sections 18 and 19 of the emergency management act, 1976 PA 390,



1 MCL 30.418 and 30.419, and R 30.51 to R 30.61 of the Michigan  
2 Administrative Code.

3 (8) Funds in the disaster and emergency contingency fund shall  
4 not be expended unless the state budget director approves the  
5 expenditure and the department and the state budget office notify  
6 the senate and house appropriations committees. If expenditures are  
7 made from the disaster and emergency contingency fund during a  
8 month, the department shall submit monthly reports to the senate  
9 and house fiscal agencies detailing the purpose of the  
10 expenditures. These monthly reports shall be submitted within 30  
11 days after the end of the month during which funds from the  
12 disaster and emergency contingency fund were expended.

13 (9) Upon the declaration of a state of emergency or disaster  
14 by the governor under section 3 of the emergency management act,  
15 1976 PA 390, MCL 30.403, approval of the state budget director, and  
16 notification of the subcommittees and senate and house fiscal  
17 agencies, the director may expend funds appropriated from any  
18 source to any line item within part 1 for the purpose of paying the  
19 necessary and reasonable expenses incurred by the department in  
20 responding to or mitigating the effects of any emergency or

23 (10) The department shall track and report on a biannual
