

# Senate Bill 316

Printed pursuant to Senate Interim Rule 213.28 by order of the President of the Senate in conformance with pre-session filing rules, indicating neither advocacy nor opposition on the part of the President (at the request of Senate Interim Committee on Judiciary and Ballot Measure 110 Implementation)

## SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Makes nonsubstantive and technical changes in Oregon law. Corrects grammar and punctuation. Conforms language to existing statutes and legislative style.

8 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

9 **SECTION 1.** ORS 174.535 is amended to read:

10 174.535. It is the policy of the Legislative Assembly to revise sections from Oregon Revised

30 63.644. (1) A dissolved limited liability company that has filed articles of dissolution in accord-

1   ance with ORS 63.631 may publish notice of the limited liability company's dissolution and request  
2   that persons with claims against the limited liability company present the claims in accordance with  
3   the notice.

4       (2) The notice must:

5       (a) Be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation in the county where the dis-  
6       solved limited liability company's principal office is located or, if the principal office is not in this  
7       state, where the dissolved limited liability company's registered office is or was last located;

8       (b) Describe the information that must be included in a claim and provide a mailing address  
9       where the claim may be sent; and

10      (c) State that, except as provided in subsection (4) of this section, a claim against the limited  
11      liability company will be barred unless a proceeding to enforce the claim is commenced within five  
12      years after the publication of the notice.

13      (3) If a dissolved limited liability company publishes a newspaper notice in accordance with  
14      subsection (2) of this section, the claim of each of the following claimants is barred, except as pro-  
15      vided in subsection (4) of this section, unless the claimant commences a proceeding to enforce the  
16      claim against the dissolved limited liability company within five years after the publication date of  
17      the newspaper notice:

18      (a) A claimant who did not receive written notice under ORS 63.641;

19      (b) A claimant whose claim was sent in a timely manner to the dissolved limited liability com-  
20      pany but not acted on; or

21      (c) A claimant whose claim is contingent or based on an event occurring after the effective date  
22      of dissolution.

23      (4)(a) A claim against a dissolved limited liability company that may be satisfied, in whole or in  
24      part, by insurance assets held by, on behalf of or for the benefit of the dissolved limited liability  
25      company, including any rights, benefits or proceeds arising or derived from the insurance assets, is  
26      not subject to the time limitation set forth in subsection (3) of this section, but is subject to other  
27      applicable statutes of limitation. A claimant that brings a claim after the time limitation set forth  
28      in subsection (3) of this section may not recover from the dissolved limited liability company more  
29      than the rights, benefits or proceeds available from the insurance assets.

30      (b) Notwithstanding ORS 63.121, a claimant may serve a summons or other process upon a dis-  
31      solved limited liability company for a claim described in paragraph (a) of this subsection by deliv-  
32      ering the summons or process to a [*director*] **manager** or officer of the dissolved limited liability  
33      company, to a person that has charge of the dissolved limited liability company's assets or, if the  
34      claimant cannot locate the [*director*] **manager**, officer or person, to any agent who was authorized  
35      to accept service of process immediately before the limited liability company dissolved.

36      (c) If a claimant states in an affidavit to a circuit court of this state that the claimant cannot  
37      after due diligence locate any of the persons described in paragraph (b) of this subsection, the court  
38      may provide in an order that the claimant may serve process upon the dissolved limited liability  
39      company by personally delivering the service, together with a copy of the court's order, to the office  
40      of the Secretary of State. Service delivered as provided in this paragraph is complete on the 10th  
41      day after the delivery.

43      **SECTION 3.** ORS 92.170 is amended to read:

44      92.170. (1) Any plat of a subdivision or partition filed and recorded under the provisions of ORS  
45      [92.018 to 92.190] **92.010 to 92.192** may be amended by an affidavit of correction:

- 1 (a) To show any courses or distances omitted from the subdivision or partition plat;
- 2 (b) To correct an error in any courses or distances shown on the subdivision or partition plat;
- 3 (c) To correct an error in the description of the real property shown on the subdivision or par-
- 4 tion plat; or
- 5 (d) To correct any other errors or omissions where the error or omission is ascertainable from
- 6 the data shown on the final subdivision or partition plat as recorded.

7 (2) Nothing in this section shall be construed to permit changes in courses or distances for the  
8 purpose of redesigning lot or parcel configurations.

9 (3) The affidavit of correction shall be prepared by the registered professional land surveyor  
10 who filed the plat of the subdivision or partition. In the event of the death, disability or retirement  
11 from practice of the surveyor who filed the subdivision or partition plat, the county surveyor may  
12 prepare the affidavit of correction. The affidavit shall set forth in detail the corrections made and  
13 show the names of the present fee owners of the property materially affected by the correction. The  
14 seal and signature of the registered professional land surveyor making the correction shall be af-  
15 fixed to the affidavit of correction.

16 (4) The county surveyor shall certify that the affidavit of correction has been examined and that  
17 the changes shown on the certificate are permitted under this section.

18 (5) The surveyor who prepared the affidavit of correction shall cause the affidavit to be recorded  
19 in the office of the county recorder where the subdivision or partition plat is recorded. The county  
20 clerk shall return the recorded copy of the affidavit to the county surveyor. The county surveyor  
21 shall note the correction and the recorder's filing information, with permanent ink, upon any true  
22 and exact copies filed in accordance with ORS 92.120 (3). The corrections and filing information  
23 shall be marked in such a manner so as not to obliterate any portion of the subdivision or partition  
24 plats.

25 (6) For recording the affidavit in the county deed records, the county clerk shall collect a fee  
26 as provided in ORS 205.320. The county clerk shall also collect a fee set by the county governing  
27 body to be paid to the county surveyor for services provided under this section. Corrections or  
28 changes shall not be allowed on the original plat once it is recorded with the county clerk.

30 **SECTION 4.** ORS 100.205 is amended to read:

31 100.205. (1) A transitional committee shall be established as provided in this section in a single  
32 stage condominium consisting of at least 20 units and in a staged or flexible condominium if the  
33 number of units [*which*] **that** the declarant may submit to the provisions of this chapter under ORS  
34 100.125 or 100.150 totals at least 20.

35 [(1)] (2) Unless the turnover meeting has been held, the declarant shall call a meeting of the unit  
36 owners for the purpose of forming a transitional committee in accordance with the bylaws of the  
37 condominium. The declarant shall call such meeting:

38 (a) In a single stage condominium, within 60 days of conveyance to persons other than the  
39 declarant of 50 percent of the units.

40 (b) In a staged or flexible condominium, within 60 days of conveyance to persons other than the  
41 declarant of 50 percent of the total number of units which the declarant may submit to the pro-  
42 visions of this chapter under ORS 100.125 or 100.150.

43 [(2)] (3) The transitional committee shall be advisory only and shall consist of two or more  
44 members selected by unit owners other than the declarant and may include not more than one rep-  
45 resentative of the declarant. The members shall serve until the turnover meeting. The function of

1 the committee shall be that of enabling ease of transition from control of the administration of the  
2 association of unit owners by the declarant to control by the unit owners. The committee shall have  
3 access to the information, documents and records [which] **that** the declarant must turn over to the  
4 unit owners under ORS 100.210 (5).

5 [(3)] (4) The declarant shall give notice of the meeting required under subsection [(1)] (2) of this  
6 section in accordance with the bylaws of the condominium to each unit owner at least seven but  
7 not more than 50 days prior to the meeting. The notice shall state the purpose of the meeting and  
8 the time and place where it is to be held.

9 [(4)] (5) If the meeting required under subsection [(1)] (2) of this section is not called by the  
10 declarant within the time specified, the meeting may be called and notice given by a unit owner.

11 [(5)] (6) If the owners other than the declarant do not select members for the committee under  
12 subsection [(2)] (3) of this section, the declarant shall have no further responsibility to form the  
13 committee.

13 for juvenile court proceedings, if the petitioner knows, or by the exercise of ordinary diligence

15 (a) That the child resided with the putative father at any time during the 60 days immediately  
16 preceding the initiation of the proceeding, or at any time since the child’s birth if the child is less  
17 than 60 days old when the proceeding is initiated; or

18 (b) That the putative father repeatedly has contributed or tried to contribute to the support of  
19 the child during the year immediately preceding the initiation of the proceeding, or during the pe-  
20 riod since the child’s birth if the child is less than one year old when the proceeding is initiated.

21 (2) Except as provided in subsection (3) or (4) of this section, a verified statement of the mother

10 against the operator or manager of the place, the employee or person acting on behalf of the place  
11 or the aider or abettor of the place or person. Notwithstanding subsection (1) of this section, in an  
12 action under this subsection:

13 (a) The court may award, in addition to the relief authorized under subsection (1) of this section,  
14 compensatory and punitive damages;

15 (b) The operator or manager of the place of public accommodation, the employee or person  
16 acting on behalf of the place, and any aider or abettor shall be jointly and severally liable for all

19 (d) The court shall award reasonable attorney fees to a prevailing plaintiff;

30 or the Attorney General may file a civil action on behalf of the aggrieved persons in the same
